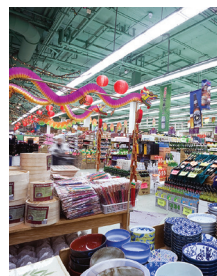

◀ WHERE TO STAY Kimpton Hotel Monaco Seattle
Whimsy is on full display in this downtown hotel. Bright pops of color liven up the lobby and guest rooms, kids get their own mini-sized robes and a “pets welcome” policy means your furry (or feathered) friend is welcome, too. monaco-seattle.com

▶ LUNCH Chinatown-International District
Seattle’s Asian hub offers plenty of eating options, but your best bets are dim sum at competing faves Jade Garden and Harbor City. After, explore the mind-blowing array of groceries, live seafood, deli fare and home goods at megastore Uwajimaya. uwajimaya.com



AFTERNOON ▶ Nordic Museum
Freshly arrived in its new home in Ballard, this museum celebrates the culture and people of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden through exhibits, classes and film—and at its café, Freya. nordicmuseum.org



DINNER ▶ Mamnoon
Locals flock to this upscale eatery for its take on Middle Eastern fare. Start with *moushakal*, a four-dip platter served with pita, before moving on to Persian fish stew or chicken with green onion and sumac. mamnoonrestaurant.com



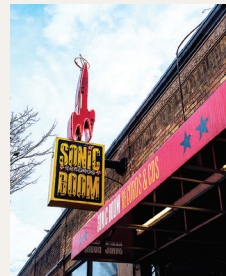
AFTER DINNER Foreign National

WHERE TO STAY ▶ W Seattle
With live music in the Living Room bar on Fridays and Saturdays; a private recording studio with a vocal booth, mixing equipment and a lounge; and special events like a beer and hip-hop yoga class, this hotel is ready to rock. wseattle.com



◀ MORNING MoPOP
The exhibits at the Museum of Pop Culture are as funky as the frequently pilloried Frank Gehry-designed building they inhabit. This month, dive into shows devoted to Nirvana, Pearl Jam and Jimi Hendrix or get hands-on with the musical instruments in the Sound Lab. mopop.org



◀ SHOPPING Sonic Boom Records
Get lost in the racks of vinyl, cassettes and CDs at this iconic Seattle music shop, which also hosts musicians for in-store concerts. sonicboomrecords.com



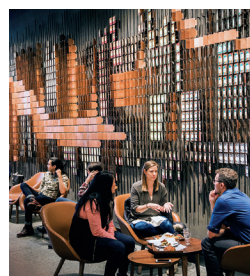
◀ AFTERNOON Jimi Hendrix Park

◀ WHERE TO STAY Inn at the Market

◀ BREAKFAST Starbucks Reserve SODO

COOKING CLASS Hot Stove Society
Located in the stylish Hotel Andra, this cooking school from prolific restaurateur Tom Douglas offers lunch, night and weekend classes. You’ll slice, dice and brew with help from top instructors—and perhaps even alongside the iconic figure himself. hotstovesociety.com



DINNER ▶ Junebaby
Chef Edouardo Jordan can do no culinary wrong, and the proof is in the biscuits, fried catfish and other traditional Southern dishes on the menu at his second restaurant—as well as in the crowds and the James Beard award gracing his mantel. junebabyseattle.com



◀ DESSERT FogRose
Seconds after being created, the sorbets and ice creams made here—using liquid nitrogen—are dished into your cup, cone or waffle bowl, ready to be adorned with fruit, edible flowers, shards of chocolate bark and more. fogrose.com

WHERE TO STAY ▶ Ace Hotel Seattle
Whitewashed brick walls make fun details pop here—the brand’s first location. Artwork from the likes of Shepard Fairey and Johnne Eschleman adorn the rooms, while curio cabinets and antlers play to the vintage feel. acehotel.com/seattle



◀ LATE MORNING The Moo Bar
Raindrop cakes—gelatinous orbs made with mineral water and a setting agent, served with kinako powder and syrup—are all the rage at this bubble tea bar, where you also may see drinks topped with puffs of homemade cotton candy. themoomilkbar.com

AFTERNOON ▶ Seattle Glassblowing Studio

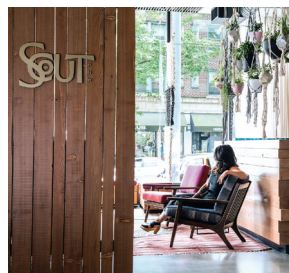


DINNER Altura

◀ WHERE TO STAY Thompson Seattle
Chic and sleek, the Thompson is the hip hotel of the moment. Head down to dinner at Scout PNW, where regional cuisine reigns, or take the elevator upstairs to the always-hopping rooftop bar, The Nest. thompsonhotels.com

MORNING ▶ Amazon Spheres
These glass globes house not only Amazon offices but also 40,000 plants from cloud regions around the world. Tours are offered two Saturdays a month—or pop into the Amazon Go store next door to try cashierless shopping. seattlespheres.com



LUNCH Westland Distillery
Take a tour to learn about the whiskey-making process at this urban distillery, then keep the party going in its Cantilever Room with cocktail flights and small bites. Don’t skip the Beecher’s cheese curds. westlanddistillery.com

EARLY EVENING ▶ Kerry Park
You can visit this popular park all day for its stunning views, but sunset is especially magical. Take in the panorama of the city, plus Elliott Bay, Bainbridge Island and, when it’s clear, Mount Rainier. seattle.gov/parks
